Green Fire: Aldo Leopold and a Land Ethic for Our Time

Green Fire: Aldo Leopold and a Land Ethic for Our Time grew directly out of an

earlier film project, *The Greatest Good*, which was a history of the US Forest Service's first 100 years, and, by extension the first 100 years of American conservation. Aldo Leopold featured prominently in that film because he was one of the early Forest Service employees whose work and ideas were greatly influenced by his experience in the National Forests of Arizona and New Mexico, and he is also one of the few individuals whose work and ideas now continue to influence the work and mission of the agency across the nation.



A production of the Aldo Leopold Foundation, the US Forest Service, and the Center for Humans and Nature. The film shares highlights from Leopold's life and extraordinary career, explaining how he shaped conservation in the twentieth century and still inspires people today. Although probably best known as the author of the conservation classic A Sand County Almanac, Leopold is also renowned for his work as an educator, philosopher, forester, ecologist, and wilderness advocate.

Green Fire illustrates Leopold's continuing influence by exploring current projects that connect people and land at the local level. Viewers will meet urban children in Chicago learning about local foods and ecological restoration. They'll learn about ranchers in Arizona and New Mexico who maintain healthy landscapes by working on their own properties and with their neighbors, in cooperative community conservation efforts. They'll meet wildlife biologists who are bringing back threatened and endangered species, from cranes to Mexican wolves, to the landscapes where they once thrived. The Green Fire film portrays how Leopold's vision of a community that cares about both people and land—his call for a land ethic—ties all of these modern conservation stories together and offers inspiration and insight for the future.

Special guest Don Hoffman AWC's former executive director and current chairman of our Board of Directors, will speak briefly on his role in the film's production, and living and working for more than 30 years in the footsteps of Leopold, in Arizona's White Mountains region.
